Now, before you rush off to pick the fireplace of your dreams, here are a few additional tips to keep in mind:

Consider your home's style and architectural elements when selecting a fireplace. Your
fireplace is typically the focal point of the room. You want it to complement the overall
aesthetics. Scale and proportion is always important, you don't want it to stick out like a
sore thumb. So choose wisely.

- It's okay to mix types! Example: The ambiance of Wood-Burning Fireplaces for outside and the convenience of Gas or Electric Fireplaces inside.
- In the 'Good-old Days' fireplaces were essential for heating and cooking in the home. In today's homes, most people think about aesthetics and ambiance of their fireplace first. Followed by initial cost, long-term energy efficiency, safety concerns, available space, cleaning and stoking requirements, as well as the potential emergency heating needs of the home. A larger room may require a larger more powerful fireplace, while a smaller space might benefit from a compact and more efficient model.
- Be careful! I recently had an interior decorator have a client glue huge sheets of stone to the walls above his fireplace. It looked incredible! However, once the fireplace was fired up, the walls heated and the glue melted. That's a problem you don't want to have.
- If you are building a high performance home "Don't forget the replacement air requirements." All that heated air going up the chimney, has to be replaced by air sucked into the home. In a high performance home you will need an EVR (Energy-Recovery Ventilator). In simple terms... An EVR filters and conditions the replacement air as it is drawn into the home. If you want a high performance home, for health and energy efficiency, you will need an EVR for replacement air for your bath room fans and range top exhaust fan. Just be sure to get one, properly sized, to address the needs of your fireplace(s) as well.
- Make your fireplace decisions early in the design process, so your architect can draft in the requirements for the proper foundation requirements and the correct measurements for the framing crews.
- As always, Don't Forget About Safety! Make sure to follow the local building codes and regulations, especially when it comes to material selections around the fireplace, as well as proper ventilation and clearance requirements.

Here's a couple of tips about Fireplaces and TVs...

- Did you know that most TVs have a 'thermal trip switch' that will automatically turn your TV off when the TV gets to hot? Several clients have mounted their TVs above the fireplace, only to discover that they could use their fireplace or their TV, but not both at the same time. So be sure to follow the manufactures specifications when installing a fireplace / TV combination. Sometimes, when you install a fireplace for heating the room, the fireplace mantel just isn't enough to protect the TV.
- Since the TV has to be a certain height above the fireplace (see above), many TVs were
 placed high on the wall. This has led to chronic sore necks, discomfort while viewing,
 and headaches. Consider a different wall for the TV or, if the aesthetics allow, a shorter
 fireplace, placed lower on the wall.
